This course offers a broad outline of the ideas of Marx and aims to familiarize students with some key philosophical themes and issues in Marxism. The first theme is the idea of the human being in Marx, framed as a labouring subject who becomes alienated from its own essence under capitalism. The political program of overthrowing capitalism thus becomes a necessary condition to overcome alienation and realize human existence. The second theme is the philosophical critique of ideology, which conceals the nature of reality in complex and psychological ways and makes people into ready instruments of a system of exploitation. The third theme is the philosophy of history, which provides the basis for an understanding of progress and social evolution through ages and the expectation of structural transformation leading to a classless society in future.

*Apart from taking part in regular discussions in the class, students will be expected to present and submit one long or two short assignments/term papers and take a mid semester and one end semester examination. 25% of the credit will be based on assignments, 25% on the mid semester exam and 50% on the end semester exam.
