Course Description:

This course titled, "India and Southeast Asia" is designed to introduce scholars of Centre for Indo-Pacific Studies on India's enhanced linkages with the Southeast Asian region particularly in the post-Cold War era. The course will examine India's foreign policy approach towards Southeast Asia while identifying areas of convergence and divergence. The course will highlight the importance of Southeast Asian region in the Indo-Pacific construct. The course will examine India's imperative to have shared interest with Southeast Asia, given India is considered an important power in the Indo-Pacific construct. The course is designed for Ph.D. scholars interested in pursuing their Ph.D. programme in Centre for Indo-Pacific Studies (SIS/JNU). The course requires its scholars to attend and actively participate in class each week.
