#### Course Description:

This course titled, "Asia-Pacific Multilateralism" is designed to introduce scholars to the realm of different powers increasingly coming together in the erstwhile Asia-Pacific region, which has now come to be known as the Indo-Pacific region. (This course originally designed for M.Phil programme by Prof. GVC Naidu, who retired in 2018 will be submitted to the School for title change from "Asia-Pacific Multilateralism" to "Indo-Pacific Multilateralism" with revisions to better accommodate the issues concerning multilateralism in the Indo-Pacific region.) Since multilateralism constitutes an important subject in the political dynamics of the Indo-Pacific region, the course will be offered to the scholars of the centre with the existing title but will be taught keeping in mind the evolved status of the erstwhile Asia-Pacific region.

This course will examine increasing interdependence in the Indo-Pacific region. The emergence of complex issues in the Indo-Pacific region coupled with strong belief in the benefits of multilateral cooperation has led to dynamic developments in the practice of multilateralism in the Indo-Pacific region. The coordination of national policies through multilateral set-up in the Indo-Pacific region will be explored. The course is designed for those interested in pursuing Ph.D. programme at Centre for Indo-Pacific Studies (SIS/JNU) and requires students to attend and actively participate in class each week.

## Course Objectives

- To understand and apply concepts to explain and assess multilateralism as well as the main drivers for increasing coming together in the erstwhile Asia-Pacific (now Indo-Pacific).
- o To further stimulate interest and curiosity in the Indo-Pacific region.

- o Demonstrate proficiency in objectively assessing and interpreting the political dynamics of the Indo-Pacific region.
